Course Description

Course Description and Credit Hours

Theoretical and specific instruction in both the conduct and application of research methods in criminal justice settings. Includes problem of research and policy dimensions of both direct and applied approaches.

If you opt out of the Access Granted Program, you will have to purchase the book from another source. The readings are required. The class assignments assume a mastery of the reading material and exam questions will come from the readings.

Course Objectives

Our society is tremendously complex and navigating it requires accurate information about the social world in which we live. Unfortunately, much of the information we are bombarded with on a daily basis is not accurate. The aim of this course is to provide you with the tools to be a critical consumer of this information by teaching you the basic methods of sociological research. This is a hands-on course. It requires you to read and evaluate research, as well as work hrough the process of conceptualizing and planning a research project, an important exercise for future producers, consumers, and subjects of research.

Assessments

There are two required components to your grade in this course: Module Exams & Journal Article Reviews.

Module Exams

There are four module exams administered in this course. Things to know about the exams:

- You will take the exam online via Blackboard.
- You are limited to one attempt at taking the exam during a 1.5 hour sitting. In other words, the exam must be completed in one sitting (no logging out and back in).
- Each exam is comprised of 50 multiple choice questions worth five points apiece.
- The exams are not cumulative.
- You may use your book and/or notes. You may not collaborate with others. You may not give to or receive help from anyone inside or
 outside of the class.
- All exams close exactly at 11:59 pm CT on the date due, no exceptions.
- If you begin the exam, or request a reset, after 10:29 pm CT on the date due, you will not have the full 1.5 hours to take it.

Since you are given a broad window within which to take your exams, your instructor does not extend deadlines or allow for makeup exams for any reason.

Journal Article Reviews

One of the best ways to learn how to conduct research is to read about completed research. In each module, you will complete a Journal Article Review. This assignment requires that you (1) select one article from a set of options, (2) read the article, and (3) answer a series of questions about the article. The article options that are given address concepts introduced in textbook readings for one of the chapters in the module. In answering the assignment questions, you are expected to refer back explicitly to the textbook to demonstrate your mastery of the material in that chapter. There is no minimum or maximum page limit for your responses, but fully answering all of the questions should require in the range of two type-written pages, double-spaced and in a 12-point font. The number of questions does not change the expected length of the finished assignment (some questions will require more effort). These assignments are completed independently. You may not collaborate with others.

You will submit your review via Blackboard. You must submit your review by 11:59 pm CT on the date due. 10 points (out of 100) will be deducted for Journal Article Reviews submitted after 11:59 pm CT on the date due. An additional 10 points will be deducted for each 24 hours a review is late.
